Wild Rice Harvest Camp - Phase one

The Red Cliff Youth Center held the first of three Wild Rice Harvest Camp yesterday, August 26th. More than 30 participants turned out to learn about the history of wild rice and how it has helped to shape the culture of the Ojibwe People.

Tribal Councilman Marvin DeFoe led the group through the process of making traditional ricing or "knocking" sticks. All of the materials were provided and participants crafted their own pair of ricing or "knocking" sticks.



One stick is used to bend the rice stalks over the side of the canoe and while the other stick "knocks" the rice from the top of the stalk into the vessel.

Chairman's Corner

Boozhoo,

I'd like to start out my very first Chairman's Corner by offering a chi miigwech (big thank you) to the entire Miskwaabekang community! You have helped positively guide me during my first six weeks as your Chairman. It has been a whirlwind month and a half so far and I appreciate the support the community has lent me. This is the first in what I hope to be many monthly reports I provide to our Membership. Each month, I'd like to offer my perspective and insight on topics important to the people of Red Cliff.



Many who were present during our inauguration ceremony may recall that one of the first things I said was that I would not make any promises. We've all heard the campaign promises before, and that is one thing I did not do and will not do. We all fall short at one time or another but those are the times that allow us to grow. Promises can sometimes lead to disappointment. If there is one thing I want to do during my time serving you it's to build trust and confidence in me as a leader. I also want us to build trust and confidence in each other as a community and build trust and confidence in Red Cliff as a Nation.

Our Tribe faces many challenges, that's no secret. My philosophy has always been to be straight forward and to pull no punches. I will not sugar-coat the issues, situations or circumstances that we face - nor will I down-play the tough decisions that we must make. I recently participated in an employee meeting regarding our gaming and resort operations in which we all heard some things that we may not have liked. Our gaming operation is a driving force in our local economy. It employs a good number of people, yet we struggle to maintain a break-even bottom line. I firmly believe that in order for our employees and Tribal Members to buy in to our vision of success, there must be transparency. This meeting was an example of that type of transparency. There are many benefits to having such a beautiful property but there are also many things we can do to maximize our potential. If we do not address those areas needing improvement, how can we make the necessary adjustments?

That fact remains that in order for us to move forward in a sound, well thought out manner, we must have those hard discussions. Once each of us realize the role and responsibility we have to the community, we become empowered. Each one of us has the power to create change - and, ultimately, build a strong, sustainable community.

Before I go any further, I want to recognize my predecessor and colleague Chairwoman Rose Gurnoe-Soulier. Chairwoman Gurnoe-Soulier did a tremendous job in promoting and advocating for the people of Red Cliff. She truly poured her heart and soul into her work, and I had the privilege of witnessing this first-hand. She has helped lay the foundation for future

successes and I consider her a mentor. I would also like to acknowledge Dennis Soulier, Mike Gurnoe and all of our Council Members, for providing the leadership to bring us to this point.

In order for us to move forward it is important that we remain grounded. There are times when we may feel as if things are just too much - times when all the pressures of the world seem to be insurmountable - those are the times in which I think about our ancestors, and what they went through to get us to this point in time. Have you ever considered the trials they must have encountered on a daily basis just to remain alive? It is astonishing when I think about it, and it brings it all back into perspective for me. I feel honored to come from such strong and wealthy people, and hope you feel the same.

It's with that train of thought that I will continue to challenge our Tribal people to do their best. Let's remain committed to one another as our ancestors did. Simple things such as stopping in to check on our Elders doesn't cost anything. In fact, you may not only make their day, you may learn a thing or two. Our culture is the cure for many of the issues from which we suffer. It is our way to care for our friends, family and community. We have many great programs, resources and opportunities here in Red Cliff. I want to work with you to maintain the great things we have and develop even more exciting opportunities for our those coming behind us. There are many challenges ahead and I may not know what the future holds but I do know this: I am extremely proud to be a part of this great Nation we call Miskwaabekang!

Indian Child Welfare Open House

On Thursday, August 20 the Red Cliff Indian Child Welfare Office held a community open house to showcase the programs and resources available, and to offer a look into just what it is they do. Nearly 60 people turned out for the event, which also included games, door prizes, and a cookout.

Often in Native American communities, the term "ICW" or "Indian Child Welfare", can evoke feelings of fear, anxiety and contempt. In 1978, the federal government passed the Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA) with the intent of keeping American Indian children with American Indian families. The law was passed in response to the alarmingly high number of Indian children being removed from their homes by both public and private agencies. The intent of Congress under ICWA was to "protect the best interests of Indian children and to promote the stability and security of Indian Tribes and families." ICWA

sets federal requirements that apply to state child custody proceedings involving an Indian child who is a member of, or eligible for, membership in a federally recognized Tribe.

Over the years, Indian Child Welfare or ICW has it has come to be known, has many times been viewed as an adversarial program. Inter-generational and historic trauma fueled by federal Indian policy, along with varying social factors, have contributed to the negative stigmas attached to ICW. Who can blame a family, a mother, a father, a grandmother or grandfather, for being suspicious of a program that deals exclusively with children, when those individuals have experienced the loss of a child or children to strangers? The boarding school era ushered in a dark time in Indian and American history. Children were stolen from their parents and grandparents - taken away to have the "Indian" removed from them. This example is exactly the reason the Red Cliff ICW office held an open house.

Director Chally Thompson (who is also a Red Cliff Tribal Member) wants to erase those stigmas and build trust within the community. She and her staff were on hand to meet the community and discuss the services offered by the program. Thompson says she wants the community to know and understand just what it is that ICW does.

"Going back to the boarding school days when social workers or government agents would just show up, and people were like, you have to hide your kids - we still get that type of response at times," said Thompson. "After talking to them, people realize we're not there to take their kids - we're there to offer assistance."

"I think people see ICW as more reactive than proactive, and that's the whole purpose of the open house: to invite people in to give them information about what we do. We want to be able to offer resources to the community," said Thompson.

A good portion of the work ICW does often deals with families in crisis. Thompson hopes that by engaging the community, the program will allow families the confidence to seek assistance before an issue reaches crisis status. "We would much rather be assisting families from a position of preventative support as opposed to coming into a situation that involves the courts or legal proceedings," said Thompson.

Another area Thompson looks to strengthen within the program is staff retention. She wants to create a wholesome, stable environment for both community members and staff.

"It appears there was a high turnover rate with both case managers and directors as well. That can definitely work against a program such as ours - not having those relationships and connections to the community is a huge obstacle to overcome," said Thompson. "We know that building positive relationships within the community is essential to gaining the trust of the people we serve."

Thompson says the goal of the entire Red Cliff ICW team is to ultimately strengthen and preserve Red Cliff's Tribal families. She believes that incorporating culturally specific practices, increasing educational opportunities and developing lasting relationships will allow the program to help families deal with the challenges life sometimes presents. "I want people to feel comfortable enough to come here without feeling they are being judged."






