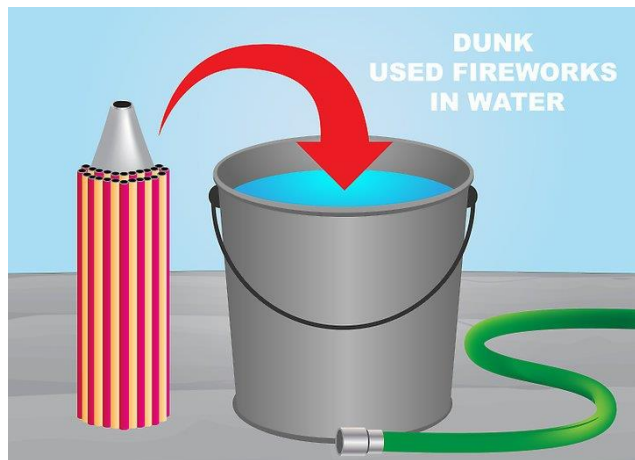


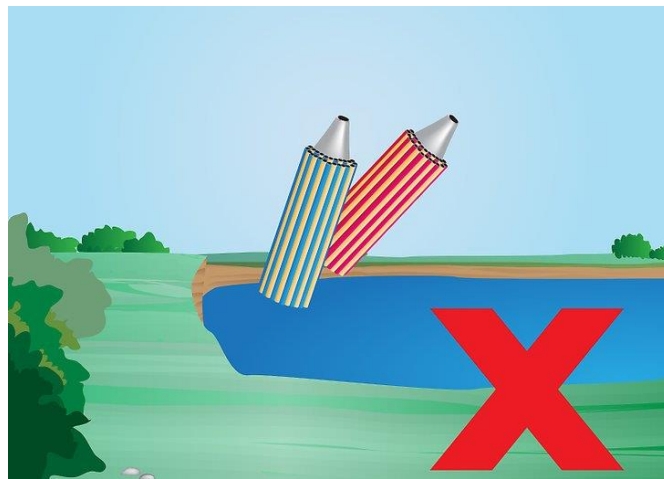
## July 4<sup>th</sup>: Fireworks and Safe Disposal

Fourth of July festivities are just around the corner! If you have unused, misfired, or "dud" fireworks, following these safe disposal steps will minimize fire hazards and help ensure the protection of you, your family, and waste haulers when handling.

- **Completely submerge fireworks in a large bucket of water and soak until thoroughly saturated. This may take a few minutes for small fireworks or as long as overnight for larger ones.**



- **Double wrap the completely soaked fireworks in plastic wrap or two plastic bags so they do not dry out.**
- **Place the double-bagged fireworks in the household trash or take them to the local solid waste facility.**
- **Please avoid dousing fireworks in lakes, ponds, or rivers because the chemical compounds can be harmful to the ecosystem.**



If you plan to store unused fireworks that have not yet expired, keep them in a cool, dry place such as a garage and out of the reach of children. Never place fireworks on top of an electrical

appliance, such as a refrigerator or freezer. The appliance could be struck or damaged through extreme weather events such as lightning or power surges, resulting in the possible ignition of the fireworks. Please also follow any other instructions accompanying the firework products.
